The highlight of the past month was having the honor to help lead a delegation of over 450 people on the Sac Metro Chamber’s annual Capitol to Capitol advocacy trip. The deepened connections between the fellow attendees are always one of the highlights of the trip for me. This year, it was even more so with the introduction of an elected officials’ reception to talk about how we can keep the momentum going on regional collaboration here at home.

This issue highlights the ongoing effort to encourage more forward-thinking solutions than the Delta tunnel project. We had a partial victory at the consistency hearings held by the Delta Stewardship Council – they remanded two of our claims back to the state Department of Water Resources but generally rubber-stamped their portion of review. Conversely, I am happy to report that the pipeline portion of the Harvest Water project is done, and part of the South County is home to some wonderful newly paved roads.

Harvest Water Project Update

As I'm sure you're aware, there has been a significant construction project affecting many of you in the south portion of the county. The Harvest Water Project has been

working to lay pipelines that will recapture a portion of treated water and repurpose it for agricultural usage.



I'm very happy to let you know that the final phases of the project are nearly finished and crews will be completing final roadway repairs within Elk Grove's city limits in the next few months.

At the end of April, crews were working on minor repairs along Franklin Boulevard between Sims Road and Percheron Drive and, starting the week of May 4, final resurfacing of Franklin Boulevard between Sims Road and Whitelock Parkway will begin. This work will require full lane closures of the following segments, with lane closures in effect from approximately 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Two-way traffic will be maintained at all times.

- May 6 and 7: between Sims Road and Laguna Boulevard
- May 8 and 11: between Laguna Boulevard and Elk Grove Boulevard
- May 12: between Franklin and Percheron, and in the Whitelock Parkway intersection
- May 13: overnight work in the intersections of Franklin and Laguna, and Franklin and Elk Grove

Finally, preparation of final striping of Franklin Boulevard will begin in mid-May, with roadway striping of Franklin between Sims Road and Percheron Drive anticipated to begin in late May.

I know this work has seemed endless and has caused a lot of delays and frustration. I thank you for your patience as crews put the final touches on this project that I believe, in the long run, will be beneficial to us all.

Delta Conveyance Project Update

In the ongoing political water grab associated with the construction of the \$20+ billion Delta Tunnels, we had some good and bad news last month as the Delta Stewardship Council (DSC) released its draft decision on the Delta Conveyance Project (DCP) Delta Plan consistency certification.

Although many compelling arguments against the DCP certification were rejected, the good news is the DSC upheld SacSewer's appeal, rejecting the state Department of Water Resources' (DWR) certification because they failed to show the DCP was sited to avoid conflicts with Harvest Water. The DSC also upheld San Joaquin County's argument that the DCP potentially improves habitat for the invasive and expanding golden mussel population.

While I am disappointed by the DSC's decision to reject many of the legal appeals, it does affirm that the state must take a harder look at the risks posed by invasive species and must also fully address conflicts with existing recycled water operations in the Sacramento region. These are not minor details – they go to the very heart of protecting water quality, infrastructure and the long-term reliability of our system. Advancing a project of this scale without fully addressing the impacts to the Delta communities, agriculture and the environment undermines the very balance the Delta Reform Act requires.

In another clear win for opponents of the DCP, the California Supreme Court denied review of a significant opinion issued by the Third Appellate District Court of Appeal last year. This marks DWR's third consecutive defeat in its bond validation action for its conveyance-based "Delta Program," originally filed in August 2020. The Supreme Court's denial of review moves DWR further away from securing legal means to finance its multibillion-dollar project and reinforces the legal safeguards that the state cannot sidestep in order to push forward a project of this size and cost.



I do find it very interesting that the project's proponents, who issued multiple victorious press releases citing the hurdles the DCP overcame with some of the rulings upheld by the DSC's draft decision, have chosen to ignore the two critical

decisions regarding the Harvest Water conflict and the golden mussels, which could potentially have major impacts on the projects pathway to construction.

Even with these setbacks, we will continue to argue for greater collaboration among all stakeholders with the shared goal of coming together to find a more complete, transparent and science-based approach moving forward.

Mental Health Awareness Month



May is Mental Health Awareness Month, an important reminder that mental health is just as important as physical health. Every person is impacted by challenges to mental health in some way, whether directly or through someone they know and care about. My hope is that by sharing information about the resources available here in Sacramento County, someone who may be struggling will know that help is available and that they are not alone.

Behavioral health care often brings to mind therapy or medication, and while those services are certainly important, Sacramento County's Behavioral Health Services system provides much more. Behavioral health includes both mental health care and substance use prevention and treatment with services for children, adults and seniors. County programs support people from all walks of life, including families in crisis, those living with complex or severe mental health needs, individuals experiencing homelessness, and support for people exiting incarceration to help ensure positive outcomes.

One of the ways Sacramento County is expanding access to care is through its CORE Centers, which stands for Community Outreach Recovery Empowerment. Located throughout the county, CORE Centers provide moderate-to high-intensity mental health services in community settings. Each site also includes a Community Wellness Center, which serves as a drop-in resource for adults ages 18

and older. Individuals can receive assistance with housing, employment, food access, wellness support, symptom management, behavioral health services and many other needs that contribute to long-term stability and recovery. These centers are designed to meet people where they are and connect them with compassionate, ongoing support.

For individuals experiencing an immediate mental health or substance use crisis, Sacramento County also provides 24/7 access to urgent support through the Mental Health Urgent Care Clinic and Treatment Center that provide walk-in services for people of all ages. For many families, this clinic offers an important alternative to a hospital emergency room. Staff can help stabilize a crisis, coordinate with outpatient providers and connect individuals with appropriate follow-up care and services.

Another critical resource available to our community is the 988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline. By simply calling or texting 988, community members can connect with trained counselors 24 hours a day, seven days a week. These professionals provide free and confidential emotional support, help assess suicide risk, identify coping strategies, create safety plans and connect callers with additional resources.

In Sacramento County, 988 can also activate the Community Wellness Response Team (CWRT), a mobile crisis response program that provides in-person support when needed. After contacting 988, trained staff can dispatch a response team to meet someone wherever they are, whether at home, in a park, at a library, or another safe location. Programs like CWRT help ensure that people experiencing a mental health crisis can receive compassionate care and intervention outside of an emergency room or traditional law enforcement setting whenever appropriate.



Mental health challenges can affect anyone. In many cases, mental health conditions have strong biological or genetic components, yet they are still too often treated differently than physical illnesses. Just as we would encourage someone to

seek treatment for diabetes, heart disease, or another medical condition, we must continue reducing the stigma around seeking support for mental health and substance use challenges.

Supporting youth mental health is also becoming an increasing priority across Sacramento County. Flexible Integrated Treatment, known as the FIT Program, is an outpatient mental health program serving children and youth under the age of 21. The FIT Program has 16 sites across the county and is designed to give families greater flexibility and continuity of care.

What makes the FIT Program especially impactful is its focus on integrating access to care into environments where children already spend their time, particularly schools and community settings. The program includes peer and family advocacy support, evidence-based practices and services that can adapt as a young person's needs change, allowing families to stay connected to the same provider even if a higher level of care becomes necessary.



I recently had the opportunity to visit Archoe Elementary School and learn more about an exciting initiative led by the Sacramento County Office of Education (SCOE) focused on prevention and early intervention for youth mental health. SCOE is working to place mental health teams in schools across Sacramento County, helping create a more proactive culture where students and their families can access support before reaching a point of crisis.

This kind of early intervention can make a life-changing difference. By connecting students and their families with mental health support early, we can help improve long-term outcomes, strengthen the overall health and wellbeing of our communities and reduce involvement in the juvenile justice system.

Mental Health Awareness Month is an opportunity to remind one another that it is okay to ask for help. If you or someone you know may be struggling, I hope this

information helps connect you with resources and services here in Sacramento County. Sometimes a simple conversation can make all the difference.

Behavioral Health Services (BHS) encompasses a range of **mental and substance use treatment services** aimed at improving well-being. These services include comprehensive assessments, treatment planning, care coordination, therapy, counseling, crisis intervention, and medication management.

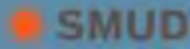
